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
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Congratulations to Rev. Brian Dierolf

Pastor's Article: Meet You at the "Corner"

I live on a corner. Every time I leave the parsonage to take a walk or drive somewhere, I decide which way to go. Such decisions might seem insignificant but the direction one chooses DOES matter. Invariably we come to corners where a decision must be made, sometimes with horns honking behind us.

Such a corner appeared where I started to voice the words of this article. I often use my phone to construct a document or at least to begin it. Lets just say my



typing skills are clumsy. The first time I "voiced in" the title of this article, "Meet You at the Corner", my phone wrote "Coroner" instead of "Corner". I'm glad I caught that! For I would surely rather meet you at the corner! (My father would say... "One can be so easily misunderstood!")

It's not wise for me to proofread my own work! For one reason, I read it back and my eyes will see what I intended to write rather than what I actually wrote. We humans always want to paint ourselves in the best light!

But corners abound where a decision must be made—sometimes without all the facts we would like to have. God's Garden Gift of Free Will (as in the Garden of Eden) has us humans in a perpetual state of brokenness—in need of repair, and not lookin' very good! This brokenness affects every one of us. Our own (very human) law enforcement professionals—police—face danger everyday. Not just the danger of being harmed, or in the path of someone who's causing harm, but the danger of misusing their authority even causing injury or loss of life. We must hold people accountable for their decisions, but we also must understand human limits of imperfection and brokenness. Our law enforcement professionals must deal with that broken world—day in and day out. It surely changes them. Life changing decisions can come at the next corner, at any moment, of any day. For law enforcement...or for you and me!

We all face risks and fears because we never know what to expect in the next moment. Perhaps you have taken comfort (as I have) in the great old Gaither gospel song which affirms: "I don't know who holds to-morrow, but I know who holds my hand." That doesn't mean that you or I will be spared from danger or from harm, but rather that we will not face it alone. The Spirit of the Risen Lord is with us—at every decision point, at every corner where a quick decision can change a life or change a family or change the future for worse...

... OR CHANGE IT FOR BETTER! So let us meet at the corner and consider how to proceed. And where is the corner? The corner of yesterday and tomorrow—right now. We make decisions in every present moment—the only place where we can ACT! And MAKE A DIFFERENCE!

Where some might say... Every tick of the clock is a Holy Moment.

May Mission of the Month: F.I.S.H.

F.I.S.H. is <u>Faithfully Involved in Sharing Hope</u> with Hunt County residents.



According to Wally Jeffers, the director, F.I.S.H. continues to provide food stuffs on-site and for Food-4-Kids and funds medical and optical appointments, glasses and prescriptions. It can even help individuals obtain Social Security cards. During the pandemic and the frigid weather, F.I.S.H. has been able to respond to needs arising from these catastrophes. Because the North Texas Food Bank is currently waiving ALL costs associated with delivering food to local communities and food pantries, F.I.S.H. has been able to use that money to pay for rent for individuals who lost their jobs because of the shut-down. They have paid the utility bills for people who need repairs caused by the frigid weather.

F.I.S.H. has also paid for medical appointments with specialists. Many people who were reluctant to venture out when COVID-19 was rampant are now trying to meet the appointments they missed. F.I.S.H. pays for the specialist's appointment. If that person needs to be hospitalized, they may then qualify for the hospital's assistance program.

<u>Judy Rudoff</u>: I know each of us has personal memories of sermons that really resonated with us from our lady ministers. But who can forget the Stations of the Cross that Pastor Lisa and Associate Pastor Dana organized in observance of Good Friday. It took a LOT of organizing and relocating of furnishings in the classrooms plus creating a printed guide to follow as one experienced the Stations.

Then there was church camp for adults. Pastor Lisa, Pastor Dana and Jennifer Washer organized a week of evening activities that include games, singing and devotionals. On Friday night, we had a potluck. Again, a great deal of work went in to organizing this week, and all of us in attendance grew in faith as a result.

Pastor Valerie Englert introduced us to the Love Feast worship service. We gathered in the Family Life Center to eat breads and muffins and drink fruit juices and give testimonies. I remember Jan Helton telling about how moved she was by a sign hanging over a "home" in Tierra Nueva praising God. (Part of Proyecto Abrigo). Although the family lived in abject poverty, the were rich in faith.

UMYF

Nancy Doughty and husband Ben were sponsors for the United Methodist Youth Fellowship. The format for the meeting was to have a snack supper provided by the parents, then junior high students would go with Ben for a devotional and senior high would stay with Nancy. Parents who had provided the supper were welcome to join the groups for the devotional and lesson time. Over the years, Nancy recalled the UMYF had dances after the football games. The youth went on two trips to Disney World. Wyman Williams remembers chaperoning one trip to Florida, sitting right behind the bus driver to make sure he stayed awake on the long nighttime ride. The youth went on ski trips and other excursions.

The youth also presented musicals for the congregation including "Jesus Christ Superstar." Nancy recalls having service projects. Head Start had just begun in Commerce and UMYF provided seasonal parties for the children. At Halloween, they also made sure the Head Start kids had costumes.

There were many fundraisers to underwrite the trips, musicals, and service projects, including a Christmas Bazaar featuring hand crafted items made by the youth. The youth Christmas Bazaar was eventually adopted by Shelley Seay as a money maker for the church. Shelly would have the materials ready and volunteers would gather weekly to make the items.

Dick and Brenda Latson were UMYF sponsors for seven years. Their goal was to make it so inviting that youth would think of FUMC as the place to be.

To drive home the point, Dick recalls buying a bunch of scratch offs to give to the youth after the gentleman's talk. As the kids scratched off their tickets, the point was well made. Many won nothing, a few won a dollar or two. Then Graham Wilkinson, son of the senior pastor, scratched off his ticket and found he had won \$100!! Laughing, Dick remembers the teaching moment changing in a second to tithing and also that Pastor Dennis Wilkinson has never let him forget the incident.

Youth programming has been carried on by church members who all strove to make faith, fun, and service the cornerstone of their program.
