## Moments of Silence to Honor Healthcare

### Workers >> September 3 @ 12-12:05

According to the Dallas Fort Worth Hospital Council (DFWHC), **September 3, 2021** will mark 18 months since the first diagnosed case of COVID-19 in Texas. The group is asking for 5 minutes of silence from 12:00 noon to 12:05pm on this day to honor all those who have been on the front-lines treating and taking care of COVID patients. “This is our way of offering thanks to our physicians, clinicians, healthcare support staff and hospitals for their tremendous efforts to prevent and treat COVID-19,” said Stephen Love, president/CEO of DFWHC.

Over the past 18 months, almost 56,000 Texas residents have lost their lives to COVID-19. As of August 25, more Texas hospitals were reporting a shortage of ICU beds than at any other time since the pandemic began, with more than 93% of hospitalized COVID-19 patients unvaccinated, according to the Texas Department of Health and Human Services.

On one of my walks down Power Line Road, Jazzmine and I found this well-worn (and lonely) boot. Right there in the gravel. The persistent *helper* in me had to pose the question: "Did somebody lose a shoe?"

Or, as the better news might be, "Did some lucky soul walk along this road *and FIND* just the shoe he or she needed, leaving the other one behind?"



Seeing just one shoe on a deserted road certainly does leave part of the story untold! I left the boot right there...just in case the one who lost it passes back by.

What have you found? As a boy I once found a shattered \$20 bill. It was so crumpled and decayed that we had to leave it at the bank. To redeem it, they needed to do some forensics and see if there was at least 51% of it remaining. I went home hoping and planning. A couple of weeks later we got a deposit slip. Finding something you lost is great. Finding something unexpected is a bonus.

What have you found? Luke tells the story of a humble woman who lost a coin and swept the entire house until she could find it and rejoice that it was found! Of course Jesus relates that to redeeming people who seem lost.

What have you lost? Maybe you feel lost in the distractions of these anxious times and you need some redemption? Have you lost your confidence? Your hope? Hope is more than just wishing things were different. Christian Hope is the confidence—even when things are not well—that **ALL WILL BE WELL!** It is confidence in *Rising... Resurrection Hope!*...even when it seems our current dreams are decaying.

If you feel lost yourself, please hear and trust that ***you are worthy of redeeming!*** Jesus guaranteed that with his life. Praise Him! Praise God!

Keep looking for what is lost; there is always hope! Christian Hope is more than just wishing—it is faithful confidence! ***So... Rise! And Be Raised! And Raise those around you!***

## Letter from Lay Leader

Dear Church Family,

You should have recently received a letter with the responses from an earlier survey. In this letter I asked for volunteers to contact members of our church and community who may be in need of prayers and support. I would like to clarify what I hope will happen.

- 1) Contact may consist of either phone calls or sending a card that the church will furnish (along with postage). The contact method you use is totally up to you and your comfort zone as well as your relationship with the person(s) you will contact. What you write on the card will be totally up to you, but I would suggest you express the desire to let them know that they are in your thoughts and prayers, that the church is there to offer help and support, and to give them an invitation to contact our church office or Pastor Sam if they are in need of spiritual guidance or help. It is strongly suggested that these notes be handwritten rather than computer generated.
- 2) Mariann or the church office will furnish you names, addresses, and phone numbers of people who have not been to church in a while. You can certainly add anyone whether church member or not that may be in need of loving contact (which is all of us!). You can also contact people who have gone through a crisis recently or in the last few years. Especially those who may need a friendly, loving contact after time has passed and the Methodist chicken spaghetti dishes no longer come but are still grieving and need your prayers and support.
- 3) The idea is to keep contacting the same people once a month or so as long as they need the contact. Isolation and grieving are a long-term process and require a long-term solution.
- 4) Ideally, it would probably be best to limit the number of people you contact to no more than ten. The reasons are twofold. The first is that it is important to have a personal relationship with the people you are contacting and they with you. Having too many people would make the personal touch more difficult. The second reason is to keep the volunteers from burning out by taking on too great a commitment.
- 5) I encourage those of you who are currently home bound for whatever reason to participate in this endeavor. Please contact the church office and we can send you the contact information and cards you need. Who is better equipped with the skills to console someone going through crisis than one who has gone through a similar crisis? By consoling others, you may be able to make more sense of your own experiences as well, and all will benefit from your advice and experience.
- 6) Due to the recent Covid outbreaks, I personally don't feel that now is a time to invite people who are dealing with health issues to come to the church in person although informing them of on-line services would be fine. When Covid is more under control, the church will resume pot luck dinners, lunches, family ministries, and small groups and certainly invitations to these events would be appropriate and welcomed when these do start. *(Continued on next page)*

## Lay Leader Letter (continued)

I've been a pharmacist for almost 50 years, including a 10-year period as an adjunct professor for Texas Tech and UT Austin pharmacy students and residents. It's too soon to come back in person if you have major health issues.

These are merely suggestions from my perspective. They are certainly not meant to be rules. The only focus I would like to see are people reaching out and touching others who are in need, lonely, or feeling isolated. Whatever and however you can convey love and caring to another is the only thing that really matters, especially during this time. The main purpose is to bring a smile to a face of someone who may be going through a rough time and that they know you care. If you are able and willing to participate, please contact the church office for contact information.



## September Mission of the Month: Raffa Clinic

The Raffa Clinic in Greenville, a non-profit, is September's Mission of the Month. Raffa, the phonetic spelling of Jehovah-

Rapha, Christ the Healer, was created by Greenville's Highland Terrace Baptist Church in 2000. It is committed to providing accurate information to women and men so that they can make informed decisions about pregnancy and sexual health, according to director Threesa Sadler. It offers pregnancy testing, sonograms for difficult pregnancies, counseling and one on one mentoring. A new program this year is Abortion Pill Reversal. If a young woman takes the abortion pill and then changes her mind and wants to salvage the pregnancy, she can go to the clinic for help. Raffa also offers group parenting classes.

Recently Raffa bought a 2nd building where non-medical services will be provided. For those who can only attend a session held in the evening because of work schedule, childcare will be available. Though the childcare center will be staffed mainly by volunteers, Mrs. Sadler is hopeful that some of the single parent clients can be paid. Not only would that provide the client with much needed funds, the individual could also use the experience to build a resume.

Raffa serves Hunt County residents as well as clients from 21 Texas counties. This year alone 466 individuals constituting 2,400 visits have taken advantage of Raffa's services. Because of the pandemic, walk-ins are not permitted. One must call 903-454-9711 and schedule an appointment. Raffa is located at 2612 Jordan in Greenville.

While all services to clients are free, Raffa's operating expenses run about \$1,369 a day. Its major fundraiser, a catered dinner at A&M-C, will be in October. Speakers will detail the medical services offered. Supporters may register in September by going to the website, [raffabanquet.com](http://raffabanquet.com). Due to space limitations and topics discussed, the dinner is only for adults.

If Raffa is a mission that tugs at your heart, your dollar bills dropped in the collection plate or checks designated for Raffa on the memo line will support this enterprise. You can also go online and click on the [Mission of the Month option](#) to donate.

Raffa also needs baby wipes. You can drop off wipes in a box outside the office.

## Friendship Sunday School Class


The Friendship Sunday School Class is meeting after the 10am worship service in the Friendship Room. Come join us!


