Dear FUMC Friends:

One of the joys of being on vacation for a decent length of time is being able to catch up on movie-going. The last weekend of our vacation, we treated ourselves to watching *The Help*, based on the novel by Kathryn Stockett. I had devoured the novel in a matter of days during my last vacation just after Christmas, and in so doing, fell in love with Aibileen, the



African-American maid with a special gift for raising the young children of her white employers. There is poignancy in Aibileen's gentleness and nurture of the white children in her care; poignancy heightened by the distrust and scorn with which she is viewed by the white family who employs her.

Seeing this movie called to mind some of my own childhood memories – none as riveting as in *The Help*, but formative all the same. When I was in third grade, we lived on the Texas coast. My sister, Yvonne, was just a few months old, and I was in second grade. The attempt to integrate schools through busing had been underway for a short time. Our mother was active in the community, and had been working hard on starting an after-school tutoring program for a community in need of such offerings. Mom's partner in this project was a woman who taught in the public school that I attended – in fact, she was my music teacher. I loved having her as a teacher, and was excited to learn that she was mom's partner in starting up the after-school program.

A week or two before Christmas that year, I was home after school fixing myself an afterschool snack in the kitchen (buttered toast, I would imagine – my favorite all through childhood). Mom was elsewhere in the house. Someone knocked at the door in the kitchen. I opened it, a bit surprised, for no one ever knocked on the kitchen door – one had to go through the garage to get to the kitchen door. When I opened the door, there stood my music teacher, with a beautifully wrapped Christmas gift. She asked if my mom was home, and I replied that yes, she was, and that I could go get her. She replied, "Don't bother her, Valarie, just please give this to her." She patted me on the arm, and turned to leave.

As she requested, I took the gift to mom. "Where did this come from?" Mom asked. "My music teacher – she left it at the kitchen door." "The kitchen door??" A look of disappointment? consternation? surprise? passed over my mother's face. She opened the card and read the thanks written there. Then Mom opened the gift, and began to weep. "Why are you crying, momma?" After she could speak, mom answered: "I wish she hadn't come to the kitchen door – I wish she had felt comfortable enough to ring at the front door." My music teacher, you see, was African-American, and African-Americans who "knew their place" at that time never called at the front door of white folks' houses.

It is a memory I will never forget.

Some of our younger generation find such happenings strange and part of an era that doesn't exist anymore. But there are still many forces at work which twist and muddy the avenues of deeper relationship between all of us. At rock bottom, though, are Paul's words, acting as beacon and corrective:

"There is no longer slave nor free, there is no longer male nor female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus."

The Property Team along with the Serve Team is pleased to announce the following job opportunity:


Someone needed to drive the church van with attached trailer to the Greenville recycling center weekly.
