Dear FUMC Friends:

In worship this past Sunday, many of you "met" Hairy – the little potted pine tree that served as our family Christmas tree for the past few years. My husband so-named the tree because of the varied pattern of its needles – some are short, and some are very long. It's a very humble, somewhat scraggly-looking little tree; very much like the little ever-



green in "A Charlie Brown Christmas." This year, Hairy has taken up residence on the front porch of the parsonage, sporting a strand of white lights.

Introducing Hairy to you set me to musing about Christmas trees, and trees in general. Scripture often compares the righteous to a fruitful tree with deep roots planted by a stream (Psalm 1) – an encouraging image for a people who lived in a harsh, arid climate. The second chapter of Genesis describes the Tree of Life and the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil that were present in the Garden of Eden. The Tree of Life appears again at the end of the Christian Bible in Revelation 22. The Tree of Life is centered in the New Jerusalem, a metaphor for the completion of God's redemptive work for all creation.

The image of Christ as the Paradise Tree or the Tree of Life began to emerge sometime around the sixteenth century, with different traditions emerging in different locales. There are some early American hymns that sing of Christ as an apple tree. I've read that this image of Christ as the Tree of Life was compelling enough to prompt people to bring evergreens into their homes as part of their preparations for his birth.

Considering this bit of history reframes for me the task of putting up a Christmas tree each year. Instead of being onerous, decorating the tree can become a devotional, prayerful exercise. In *From Holidays to Holy Days*, Father Albert Holtz puts it most articulately: "[This] strikes me as a great idea; putting Christ, who came into our midst at Bethlehem, right in the middle of your living room, right where he wishes to be, in the center of your family's life."

May Christ's light and presence shine in the center of your homes, and your hearts –
