

# Volunteers Serve 220 Households through "Hunt County Gives"

On the Saturday before Thanksgiving, our church hosted the "Hunt County Gives" food basket distribution for the Commerce area and a pancake breakfast for all. Hunt County Shared Ministries - FISH leads this program, which had 1,129 households registered coun-

tywide. 220 households claimed their Thanksgiving baskets in Commerce, up by 53 compared to last year.

The event was marked by tremendous support of the church and our community. Over 50 volunteers came from our church family, the Wesleyan Campus Ministry, the Commerce Food Pantry, the Bread of Life Food Pantry, the Commerce Police Department, and Texas A&M University – Commerce to share their time and their love with our neighbors. The University and SSC also provided a forklift and volunteers to unload and transport eleven pallets of food. Brookshire's loaned us grocery carts and invited us to keep two carts for future use at the church. Some 200 people enjoyed a hot breakfast students and Pastor Brian Dierolf flipped pancakes, MUGS on the Square brewed coffee, and Omega's do-

nated scrambled eggs. TAMUC student Ayodele Adenugba's reflection sums out how many volunteers felt after a morning of service:

It was just heartwarming to hear the people's "thank yous" for such a small service. I will keep this in mind every time I feel overwhelmed. Also, today I saw how a smile can change one's outlook. It was a thought-provoking experience for me.

The "Hunt County Gives" Christmas food basket distribution is scheduled for Saturday, December 21, at the First Baptist Church. Households who registered in October and picked up their Thanksgiving basket are eligi-

ble to receive the Christmas basket.

# **December Mission of the Month: Proyecto Abrigo**

It's December and beginning to look a lot like Christmas! The Family Ministry Center is decked out in splendor for our Merry Marketplace for Missions this weeked. It has put us all in a festive mood for the holidays. The rich scent of the Pattons' hearty stew for the Wesleyan that mingled with the tempting aroma of home baked delights, as well

as the visual smorgasbord of antiques and collectibles, put us all in a festive holiday mindset. It's that time of year to decorate with lights fantastic and swirls of ribbons and rolls of colorful wrapping paper. Gingerbread houses, scented candles, egg nog, holiday parties, red velvet dresses, extra house cleaning and special cooking to prepare for the arrival of family and guests from afar. All these things are integral parts of the holiday season for most of us.

But let's consider what truly makes Christmas, well, Christmas. That cold lonely night at the inn where there was no room. A road-weary husband seeking refuge for his young wife, a mother-to-be great with child who would be delivered that night. No place to lay their heads save for a hay-filled stable. Our Lord and Savior came into the world in the most humble of settings, and was laid in an animal food trough for a crib. Quite a juxtaposition from the hustle and bustle and glitz and glamor we use to celebrate His birthday today, wouldn't you say?

A visit to Proyecto Abrigo, or, in English, Project Shelter, in Juárez, México, will bring you abruptly out of the glitz and thrust you into cold desert nights not so unlike the night Jesus was born. The inn's stable in Bethlehem, Jesus's first "home," and the daily living conditions of the residents of east Juárez are not so different, either. Families there live in extreme poverty. Many have migrated north from Southern México looking for work and seeking a better life for their children and themselves. These families live in rudimentary structures made from a patchwork of cardboard and chicken wire for housing frames and are topped with large black trash bags for roofs. The desert sand is their floor unless they can somehow manage to scrounge old discarded pieces of fabric or parts of shredded rugs that have been salvaged from the many garbage heaps that are to be found just over the next hill.

For these of God's children Proyecto Abrigo was founded. In 1992, after graduating from John Wesley Seminary in Monterréy, México, Rev. José Luís Portillo invited volunteers from the US to come help construct his church building where he would serve his first pastoral assignment back in Juárez. The volunteers asked how they could help the families they saw living in cardboard shacks, so in 1996, Rev. José Luís founded the ecumenical organization he named Proyecto Abrigo, a home-building mission to provide permanent housing for families who proved they wanted to do better. He turned to his United Methodist friends in the US for volunteer help and financial assistance to construct 12'X24' cinderblock houses. Several thousand houses, five churches, a medical clinic, a vocational school, and community center have been built since that time.

Judy Rudoff has often remarked how an entire Proyecto Abrigo home could fit in her living room. Yet these structures are palaces compared to what these families had been living in. Often, the original structures are left intact to function as "overflow" rooms, especially for large families. The entire cinderblock home is a single room with two windows and a door. Each has a hand-poured concrete floor and is finished with a slightly pitched roof to keep the rain from coming in. As many as ten or twelve people move into these homes and are blissfully happy and feel overwhelmed with their blessings.

Volunteer teams travel to Juárez to sleep in dormitory bunks and to work hard every day shoveling sand, mixing mortar, and "buttering" cinder blocks with the wet mortar until the home is built. Once completed, the home blessing takes place. Every team does it a little differently. This church has traditionally made a trip to the local Soriano's store (similar to Walmart) and pooled their (Continued on next page)

resources for a blessing basket for the family. On the day of the blessing, the family gathers inside their new house along with the home building team. José Luís prays for the family and the team and then administers Holy Communion, the first meal in the new home. It is an unprecedented gift to be present at this holy time.

This is Christ in action. This is what Christmas is all about. Please give generously to Drop a Dollar or write a check with Proyecto Abrigo on the memo line to help support this life-changing mission effort.

And seriously consider joining with your church sisters and brothers the next time a mission trip to Juárez comes up. You will be blessed in more ways than you can possibly imagine. Merry Christmas!

# **CASA for Hunt County Needs Volunteers**

CASA for Hunt County is always seeking volunteers wanting to help Hunt County's most vulnerable children -- those who have been removed Court Appointed Special Advocates from their abusive home and placed into the foster care system. As of November 21st, there were

170 Hunt County children who were in foster care.

CASA stands for Court-Appointed Special Advocate. CASA volunteers are screened and highly trained to become the voice for a child or sibling group during the time they are in the care and custody of the state (foster care). To become a CASA volunteer, you need to be age 21 or older, pass criminal and CPS background checks, and complete 30 hours of training.
