



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Community Thanksgiving

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Dear FUMC Friends:

When I was a child, it seemed normal to see the funeral processionals and ceremonies of noteworthy people on television. I was too young to remember seeing the funeral of John F. Kennedy, Jr., but I do remember the events surrounding the deaths of Martin Luther King, Jr., and Robert Kennedy. To my first- and second-grade mind, that was part and parcel of what happened on television – the funerals of those who had been "assassinated" (even though I didn't know what that word meant).



It is sobering to think that our country experienced the assassinations of so many leaders in such a short time. The decade of the 1960s was a roiling soup pot bubbling over with change. Challenges to the status quo ensued on many fronts: the sexual revolution, feminism, the fight for civil rights. I find myself wondering where I would have stood on these issues if I'd been an adult at the time. Would I have spoken up or remained silent?

I have heard my mother share her story of growing awareness of the evil of racism in the early 1960s, and her awakening to the cause of civil rights. Perhaps I would have had a similar experience – but there is no way to know this.

What I do know is that Dr. King's "Letter From a Birmingham Jail" still convicts me these five decades later. When Dr. King arrived in Birmingham in 1963 to join with the local African American community in a demonstration that led to his arrest, several white clergymen in Alabama – including two Methodist bishops – signed a letter stating that the demonstrations were "unwise and untimely", and had been improperly instigated by "outsiders." In response to this, Dr. King composed a letter while sitting in the Birmingham jail that every disciple of Jesus Christ should know and heed:

I am in Birmingham because injustice is here. Just as the eighth-century prophets left their little villages and carried their "thus saith the Lord" far beyond the boundaries of their hometowns; and just as the Apostle Paul left his little village of Tarsus and carried the gospel of Jesus Christ to practically every hamlet and city of the Greco-Roman world, I too am compelled to carry the gospel of freedom beyond my particular hometown. Like Paul, I must constantly respond to the Macedonian call for aid.

Moreover, I am cognizant of the interrelatedness of all communities and states. I cannot sit idly by in Atlanta and not be concerned about what happens in Birmingham. Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly affects all indirectly. Never again can we afford to live with the narrow, provincial "outside agitator" idea. Anyone who lives inside the United States can never be considered an outsider.

We are celebrating the birth of the Christ Child who came among us not only to save us from sin, but to show us what a liberated life in God's Kingdom is like. The very existence of those who remain oppressed by injustice is not part of God's dream for creation. As Dr. King said, "oppressed people cannot remain oppressed forever."

On January 20, we will remember Dr. King's remarkable life of service and sacrifice. Let it also be a day for us to remember why God-in-Christ was born: to "bring good news to the poor, to proclaim release to the captives, and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." (Luke 4.18-19)

May we find ourselves on the side of justice and peace –




