Summer Choir is Coming! **June 2012**




For anyone who enjoys singing... Can't read music? Great! You should come! Can read music? Great! You should come!

What a beautiful spring it has been – especially for flowers. The rose bushes at the parsonage are loaded with blooms, and here at the church office we've been enjoying rose buds in vases on our desks (both from our own bushes and from those of kind parishioners who have brought them by). Roses can be fussy plants, but their fragrance and beauty make them worth the effort (at least I think so – my husband differs with me on this).



My grandmother grew beautiful roses back in the day. I've heard my mother tell a story about a prized rose in the front yard that my grandmother coddled. One spring evening right before dusk, my grandmother was making the rounds in her yard, inspecting her blooming plants and flowers. When she arrived at this prized rose bush in the yard, she called my mother over, saying, "Look, sister! It has a bud on it – it will open in the morning!" My mother, a young school girl at the time, acknowledged the full bud at the top of the plant, and went back to the game she had been playing.

The next morning, the rose bud had indeed opened, showing forth the promise of the beauty to come later in the day. As my mother ran out to catch the school bus, my grand-mother held her back a moment. She pulled her shears out of her apron pocket, and snipped the bud off the bush. She pinned it to the front of my mother's dress. My mother protested, "But mother, this is the only bud off your prize rose bush!" And grandma responded, "This is where it needs to be, right here."


Gifts such as these are rare and special, and cost virtually nothing – at least with regard to dollars and cents. But the blessings and value that such gifts impart are immeasurable.

Roses pop up in Christian symbolism. I recall hearing a lovely performance of a medieval piece, "There Is No Rose of Such Virtue," a hymn to Mary and her baby son, Jesus. The five-petaled, old-fashioned rose is a centuries-old symbol of Christ's five wounds. It seems to me that such symbolism attempts to describe the immeasurable love of God in Christ, a love of such beauty that words fail us.

Through Christ's resurrection, that "rose" has been pinned to our collars and dresses, and placed in our hearts. It is an immeasurable gift.

May you live into the gift of Christ's resurrection this Eastertide -

Turning Your Generous Giving into Blessings

During this Lenten season, \$1,970 was received through special gifts and drop-a-dollar to benefit Proyecto Abrigo and FUMC-C youth in mission.

Proyecto Abrigo is a non-profit, ecumenical ministry serving brothers and sisters in Christ in Juarez, Mexico. Under the leadership of Reverend Jose Luis Portillo, the poorest of the poor receive assistance through a variety of missions including cement block home building, the food pantry, a school,

and the Angeles de Esperanza Medical Clinic. In the past, members of our church traveled to Juarez to build homes and volunteer in the clinic, but since early 2011, no U.S. mission teams have traveled to Juarez because the potential of danger is too great. As Jose Luis briefed us last October during his visit to FUMC-C, the best ways to impact the work of Proyecto Abrigo at this time are monetary gifts and prayers.

In addition to \$1,000 of our Lenten offering, the Connect-Grow-Serve team designated \$1,000 of the drop-a-dollar funds to support Proyecto Abrigo. Our prayer is that this gift totaling \$2,000 will enable the medical clinic team to purchase prescriptions and supplies that are in short supply due to lack of funding. The decision to support the clinic is based on expressed needs communicated by Jose Luis to Pastor Dana Coker during Proyecto Abrigo's annual budget planning. The other portion of the Lenten offering, \$970, will support FUMC-C youth in mission this summer. Pastor Marc Corazao will lead a group of middle school students participating in C2K - Connect to the Kingdom, which is a project of the Council on Youth Ministries of the UMC North Texas Conference. For one week this summer, they will work in teams with inner-city families and churches in West Dallas. They may perform repairs to homes and church

buildings or help churches with VBS and other summer ministries. Pastor Valarie Englert and our high school students are joining the U.M. ARMY (United Methodist Action Reach-Out Mission by Youth) to serve those in need in Wichita Falls from June 10 - 17. Look for future ways to support our youth in mission this summer.



We're gearing up for VBS! This year we'll dive in and discover God's underwater universe with Cokesbury's Operation Overboard! We'll explore the depths of God's Word at VBS 2012, and "Dare to Go Deep with God!"

Operation Overboard Vacation Bible School will be June 18th – 22nd 2012, for kids who have *completed* Pre-Kindergarten – 5th grade.

As we start wrapping our brains around transforming our building and sanctuary into an undersea wonderland, there are a few items we could use:

- ★ Plastic (or any other material) fish, seashells, lobsters, crabs, seahorses, coral, etc
- * Scuba gear
- ★ Fish nets
- ★ Blue cellophane, material, butcher paper, or sheets (that could be used as an underwater backdrop)
- * Any other decorating items or props that might help to create an undersea look and feel

Nearly 90 percent of all diseases in the world are caused by unsafe drinking water, inadequate sanitation, and poor hygiene. Every year, there are 4 billion cases of diarrhea as a direct result of drinking contaminated water; this results in more than 2.2 million deaths each year—the equivalent of 20 jumbo jets crashing every day.




The weakest members of communities are the most vulnerable; every day water-related diseases claim the lives of 5000 children under the age of five. That's roughly one every 15 seconds.

Anthony Harris' Gifts of Moments

Mother Teresa once said: *One of the greatest diseases in life is being nobody to anybody*. In a new book by Dr. Anthony J. Harris, the author enhances that quote and promotes the notion that, although there is ample evidence to support Mother Teresa's quote, by contrast one of the greatest joys in life is *being somebody to somebody*. In his book, *Gifts of Moments: Being Somebody to Somebody*, Dr. Anthony J. Harris, presents compelling and poignant stories that demonstrate his own efforts to be somebody to somebody. The stories are from his childhood, young adulthood, and older adulthood. There is also a quote from Maya Angelou, who said: *There is nothing more agonizing than having an untold story inside of us*. So, at the end of each chapter and at the end of the book, the author encourages the reader to recall their own stories and to share them with others about how they have been somebody to somebody and have used their gifts of moments wisely. By doing so, he believes, the





hearer or reader of those stories will very likely have an uplifting and positive reaction.

About the author: In 1982, he received his doctorate at East Texas State University (now Texas A&M University-Commerce). He served for 15 years (6 as chair) as a member of the school board in Commerce. He served as Assistant to the President under the late Dr. Jerry D. Morris and as faculty member at Texas A&M University-Commerce. He and his family are members of First United Methodist – Commerce. He founded Project Keep Hope Alive, an after school mentoring program for at-risk African American males in the Commerce and Greenville school districts. The book is currently available at Amazon.com in both paperback and Kindle version. It is also available at Barns and Nobles.
